How can a Catholic best safeguard his faith? A Catholic can best safeguard his faith by making frequent acts of faith, by praying for a strong faith, by studying his religion very earnestly, by living a good life, by good reading, by refusing to associate with the enemies of the Church, and by not reading books and papers opposed to the Church and her teaching. (I know that after my departure fierce wolves will get in among you, and will not spare the flock. And from among your own selves men will rise speaking perverse things, to draw away the disciples after them) (Acts 20:29-30).

What are the sins against hope? The sins against hope are presumption and despair.

When does a person sin by presumption? A person sins by presumption when he trusts that he can be saved by his own efforts without God's help, or by God's help without his own efforts. (Nay I do not even judge my own self. For I have nothing on my conscience, yet I am not thereby justified (I Corinthians 4:4)

Sacramentals by Brother John M. Samaha, S.M.

Tucked in our pockets, hanging around our necks, on our walls and rearview mirrors, standing on a shelf or mantle, sacramentals remind us, inspire us, and assist us as we live our lives in the footsteps of Christ.

Sacramentals include more than rosaries, medals, statues, pictures, and crucifixes. Sacramentals are all those sacred signs, actions, articles and items that remind us of our baptismal consecration and bring us closer to the sacraments. They remind us of the action and love of God in our lives. They are conduits of God's grace.

Sacramentals are blessed items packed with meaning and symbolism and tied with a ribbon of grace. They are all the external signs the Church offers us to aid us on our journey of faith, things that assist us in our life of prayer and of charity and connect us to our loving God.

Sacramentals are not lucky charms, but tangible signs that we human beings use to navigate the road to heaven and keep us healthy in our faith. Among these aids are prayers, rituals, rosaries, medals, statues, images, Bibles, scapulars, holy water, candles, and more. These objects are made holy by a blessing, treated with reverence, and designated for a sacred purpose. They are not intended for superstitious use.

Nor are they simply souvenirs of special places and events. They are meant to help us grow in faith and in virtue.

The best tool is only a paperweight if not used properly and effectively. So also with sacramentals. They are intended to keep us aware of God's love and assistance in our lives. These signs remind us of the journey and the destination.

Sacramentals are means of evangelization. Even non-Catholics use sacramentals, for they receive blessed ashes on Ash Wednesday, they wear crucifixes and medals, they receive blessings on special occasions and use holy water, they reverence the Bible and icons.

The homes of the faithful have been enriched with favorite practices employing sacramentals. These customs vary widely and range from honoring crucifixes and holy pictures mounted on the walls, to statues positioned in special locations, to prayer and blessing rituals. A family Bible or another object of piety may be prominently displayed.

Baptism leaves a mark on our souls, and the use of holy water renews that dedication at church and at home. A holy water font in the home reminds us to bless ourselves in our comings and goings, and to bless our children as they prepare to sleep at night. Every such gesture is a step toward our eternal destiny. What practices hold sway in your home?

In times of trial and doubt as well as during times of cultural change and societal upheaval, these physical symbols and practices help us to weather those storms. Sacramentals, properly used and reverenced, can be the needed anchors.

In today's life of faith we are encouraged to re-experience these items. We need them to draw us closer to God and the Paschal Mystery.
